Entry onto the Foundation Degree in Criminology will be via a successful interview.

At the interview learners will be expected to discuss their reasons for studying the course and how they wish to progress in the judicial system.

Candidates would normally produce evidence of a number of the following:

- Maths GCSE at grade C or above
- English GCSE at grade C or above
- A minimum of 64 UCAS points
- A pass at Level 3

Applications are welcome from mature students with an appropriate portfolio of work/experience.

EU students for whom English is not their first language will be required to provide evidence of an IELTS score of 6.0 or equivalent. Interview may be conducted by telephone, if appropriate.
